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# resident's Message

ar and away one of the best ways to keep someone coming back (to anything from a sport to a restaurant) is to be authentic about what you say you are. Treat folks such that when they leave they are saying to themselves and each other, "I want to come back". How do we do that? Being friendly and welcoming is a given; however, there are other basic behaviors that are equally as compelling.

Are we being authentic, and what does that mean in the context of NATRC? It means are we doing what we say in regards to our judging, are we following our own guidelines, do we follow our mission, vision, and philosophy and our hard carved Strategic Plan? More than once I've said it, and I'll repeat it again. NATRC attracts smart and savvy folks who are not fooled by smoke and mirrors, and who recognize a lack of authenticity.

Recently I talked about the Elephant in the Room - some representing us as one thing, others as something else. Such mixed signals and varied representation really damages our authenticity and credibility and can be very confusing to newer folks. I'm not suggesting anyone's doing this purposefully. Rather it probably depends upon how each individual perceives the sport, and how it was first presented to them.

Imagine, if you will, the perception of a newcomer brought to a ride by a friend who has gushed about how great NATRC is. NATRC is a distance competition, you, the newcomer, are told, where you can really test yourself and your horse. The fittest, soundest, and sanest horse wins the day, and your physical and mental conditioning programs are both important.

However, at the actual ride, the pace is so slow, and no stress is put on the horse. Your condition-

ing program was for naught as you walked most of the ride. And goodness - the obstacles you were asked to do. Although you could do them, you wonder what they had to do with a sane and competent competitive trail horse doing a distance competition. You were looking for a challenge, and although the people were nice, you just did not find things guite as your friend had portrayed.

Or - you are brought to a ride by a friend who has gushed about how great NATRC is. NATRC is a trail competition, you are told, where you can really test your horse on all those skills and maneuvers you've practiced at home. The best trail horse wins, you are told, and your horse really doesn't have to be all that fit because NATRC encourages all breeds and types of horses. However, at the ride you find you have to ride 40 miles! over 2 days, and you even had to trot a good bit of it. And that Vet Judge? She kept checking your horse's hydration, capillary refill, mucous membranes, listening to heart and lungs and gut sounds, and even checked something called anal tone!. She kept checking out your horse's withers, legs, back and loins, and doggone it if she didn't keep having you trot to see if your horse was sound. And she took off points for that! And although you were asked to show some of yours and your horse's skills, you were really expecting more. You were looking for a challenge, and although the people were nice, you just did not find things quite as your friend had portrayed.

Authenticity surely affects our credibility. And, of course, that affects the value of our judging and whether it is believable. Right now we are a judged sport, so if our judging isn't authentic to what we

say, and if our riders don't have faith in our process. then we lose credibility and the integrity of our iudaina



and structural soundness of our organization suffers.

So bear with me as I use an analogy to finish illustrating my point. Think about going into any business - could be a restaurant. You have a craving for good BBQ. Not pizza, not chicken wings. Just BBQ. The sign says, "Good BBQ at a good price"; "Fast and friendly service." You're met by a courteous and respectful greeter who very efficiently guides you to your table. Your server answers all your questions about the menu with a guiet confidence. She knows exactly what she's talking about. Very quickly your drink orders are taken, and shortly thereafter so is your food order. The wait for your food is not too long. The BBQ is good. The service is good - fast and friendly. There is an air of competence about the place. Folks know what they're doing. This business is authentic. It is just as advertised. It is credible. It is competent. And it is very professional. You leave happy. You leave feeling good about spending your money there. You leave knowing you want to go back.

Be authentic. Be credible. Be competent. Be professional. Treat people like we want them to come back. And they WILL come back.



uccessful muscular effort depends On the muscle tissues being supplied with adequate oxygen from blood pumped by the heart. Research has shown that there is a training effect in that as fitness improves, the heart rate response to the exercise involved becomes more efficient, and that there is a more rapid decrease in the heart rate after the exercise stops. Thus, heart rate recovery is an important indicator of a horse's level of fitness. Standardized treadmill tests are a useful research tool, but taking the pulse is a practical, useful test in the field. Failure of optimum heart rate recovery could be due to inadequate conditioning for that level of work, musculoskeletal pain, dehydration, or other metabolic problems.

Pulse and respiration (P&R) recoveries after 10 minutes have been used as a measure of the horse's condition on NATRC rides since the inception of the sport. The pulse is counted for 15 seconds, recorded, and scored according to guidelines set by the Judges Committee.

Nancy Kasovich, horsemanship judge and past NATRC President, recalls being good friends with Kerry Ridgeway, DVM, when he started his practice in Santa Rosa in the 60's. Dr. Ridgeway was an NATRC veterinary judge, and they talked about how a smart rider could sometimes whisper a horse through borderline P&R's. It was then that Dr. Ridgeway began formulating an idea for more accurately measuring heart recovery without the "whisper effect".

Dr. Ridgeway credited Dr. Jim Steere, Novato, CA, with also having a part in "indexing" a recovery heart rate. Dr. Steere's idea was that a percentage of recovery might provide a better way of determining recovery. They tried a system of retaking the pulse every 5 minutes until the pulse reached a certain percentage. Although the idea was good, it was logistically hard to do in practice. Dr. Ridgeway then, over a 2-year period, collected data on four NATRC rides. He used the concept of a paired heart rate, the first being taken when the horse was presented for examination, and the second heart rate being taken after a short trot-out. After comparing this data with the fatigue scores as determined form the usual fatigue parameters, he found that the "OK" horses fell under a beautiful bell shaped curve, and the definitely fatigued horses routinely fell outside the curve. In 1985, Dr. Steere, head veterinarian for the Levi Ride and Tie. gave Dr. Ridgeway the go-ahead to try the (now called) CRI at a particular checkpoint on the ride. Later that year, Dr. Ridgeway used a refinement of the technique at the 1985 Race of Champions in Colorado. He and the other veterinarians were enthused about the results and the conclusions drawn

from "questionable to continue" horses

Since then. the Cardiac Recovery Index (CRI) has been used extensively in AERC endurance rides and has become a useful tool in other equine sports as well. The basic procedure is to take the horse's pulse, ask him to be trotted out for 125 feet and back, and retake the pulse at exactly 1 minute

after the start of the trot. Ideally, the second pulse should be equal to or less than the first. Both the initial count and "recovery" count are important. In endurance rides, the CRI is used as one of the parameters to determine a horse's ability to continue. A horse with an initial pulse of 44

beats per minute (bpm) and a second/recovery count of 48 bpm would be considered fully recovered. But a horse that exhibits an initial count of 64 and a recovery count of 68 would be considered metabolically questionable. However, the standardization of a procedure and scoring protocol in NATRC rides has been problematic.

In 2014, Kim Cowart, President of NATRC, initiated a conversation about consistency of judging and standardization of processes for the sake of our riders and our sport. In response to Kim's challenge, we started talking about the possibility of utilizing the CRI on a more routine and consistent basis at our rides. As Kim said, we veterinarians should be there for the horse. Eighty-five percent of the weight of our judging should be put toward condition and soundness. Over the past several years, with the gradual lessening of the challenge of the rides, both in reduced mileage and reduced speed, it has become increasingly difficult to identify those horses who are not as fit as others.

You've asked us to evaluate the horse's condition, and the CRI is a good tool to use for that.

Our working premise is that the CRI could be a valuable tool in assessing just how well the horses are handling the day's work. The data from the CRI is objective and can be scored objectively, just as is the case with P&R checks. The CRI does not actually have to be done by the veterinarian, again just as with P&R checks.

To properly run a

CRI, a fair amount of room plus adequate and capable personnel are essential. The CRI needs to be run near the end of the day's competition for the results to be the most valid. It also needs to be run in a way that does not inhibit the progress of the ride.

You've asked us to evaluate the horse's condition, and the CRI is a good tool to use for that.


After quite a bit of discussion around all these concerns, we proposed conducting the CRI at the end of each day exactly 10 minutes after crossing the finish line and using a scoring system that took into account both the initial and recovery pulse counts. We participated in several CRI's at Region 1 and Region 2 rides in 2014 and 2015, and others conducted the CRI test on horses at rides in other regions.

Several lessons have been learned. One is that good communication before the ride between the ride veterinary judge and ride management helps sets the stage for cooperation and success. Another is that a clear, calm explanation of the CRI value and procedure at ride briefings goes a long way towards addressing riders' concerns. The procedure can be competently performed by P&R teams, but they should be the "A" teams to help instill confidence in the riders. Since counts are taken at exactly 1 minute, recounts are not "part of the deal." Ten minutes postfinish presented logistical problems for the riders, and a window of 15-30 minutes post-finish offers more flexibility without compromising the value of the test. The horse does not necessarily have to be trotted by the rider.

Scoring has been a tough issue to address. Jerry Gillespie, DVM, head of AERC's Research Committee and a specialist in equine cardio-pulmonary physiology, has been investigating the use of the median (mid-point) CRI count. This mid-point addresses both of the important criteria – the initial count and the recovery count – and makes a lot of sense.

There is a scoring moratorium on the CRI for 2016. We hope many of you will try the test and record values on the scorecards without actually deducting points. This will be a year of gathering and analyzing data that will hopefully add to our understanding and implementation of the CRI in NATRC competitions. Our current suggested protocol and scoring log is presented separately in this issue. Please see <a href="https://www.natrc.org">www.natrc.org</a> for the most current! We will follow the data to a finished protocol and scoring system.

# CARDIAC RECOVERY INDEX (CRI) PROTOCOL GUIDELINES FOR USE AT NATRC™ RIDES

### 1. The Procedure:

- The CRI is best performed near the end of the day's ride, making the results as valid as possible. There
  needs to be enough room and sufficient personnel so that the CRI is performed with a minimum of delay to the progress of the ride.
- Be prepared to start the CRI 15 minutes after the first rider completes.
- The current recommendation is to perform the CRI in camp, after the day's ride has been completed. Each rider reports for the CRI, with horse untacked, between 15 30 minutes after completion time.
- The ride timer shall give each finisher a slip of paper with their finish time, in real time. All CRI personnel shall have their watches in sync with the ride timer.
- Riders are responsible for arriving on time for their check. Tardiness that prevents comparative evaluation may be penalized.
- A course 125 feet long with even footing is required, ideally marked with either cones or chalk. Enough
  room for at least two trotting lanes is required.
- The personnel to conduct the CRI shall be experienced P&R team members, veterinary students, and/or a veterinarian. Depending on the size of the ride, there should be at least two people (two trotting lanes), preferably three, able to take the pulse so that there is no waiting.
- Preferably one scribe with a clipboard and a CRI log can do the recording for all of the pulse takers (see attached "Log"). If personnel are limited, each pulse taker can record their own results.
- A "resting pulse" is taken for a 15-second count. The horse is asked to trot out 125 feet and return. The pulse taker notes the time at the exact beginning of the trot. At exactly 1 minute, a "recovery pulse" is taken. Those two pulse numbers are given to the scribe along with the competitor's number. The same person must take both pulses.
- The rate of the trot is not a particular factor, as there will be more or less rest time depending on a fast or slow trot. The horse is easily able to trot the 250 feet in less than 1 minute. Note: A substitute may trot the horse for the rider.

### 2. Scoring:

- Record the initial pulse, the 1-minute recovery pulse, and calculate the median/ mid-point of the two values.
- Round down fractions. Score the median value according to the P&R scoring guidelines.



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
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# **National Appreciation**

You see her small figure scurrying across ride camp. she never goes anywhere at low speed, always on the go, always busy, always helping WHEREVER needed. She seems to be completely tireless. Before she moved away from our area earlier this year, she served as either the Horsemanship Judge or the Rules Interpreter at virtually all of our rides, for nearly as long as any of us can remember. In the rare instance when she didn't have an "official" job, she could be found working as a Judge's Secretary, or driving judges and/or P&R crews in her own vehicle, or just being an invaluable gofer. She also takes hundreds of photographs of horses and riders and volunteers and uses those pictures to put together our wonderful regional awards program every year.

She still serves as our National BOD representative and as our region's Ride Coordinator, both of which she has done for many years. And she is still on the Region 1 BOD,

overseeing us and keeping us all on track. She is somehow able to come up with every file, every email, every historic award, and every whatever whenever that information is needed. Her filing system is utterly amazing. In all honesty, we would be lost without her! And so much of what she does for our region, she also does for National, and more. She is the proofreader and advisor for both Hoof Print and our region's Leadline newsletter.

How can such a tiny person have such an enormously full plate? And she juggles it all flawlessly. Guardian Angel, yes! Energizer Bunny, yes! Jugglemeister, yes! Or, simply put, Super Wonder Woman, yes!!! Santa Claus may have his worker elves but NATRC is blessed to have this incredible multi-tasker. She is a Shire workhorse in a small Arabian body!

Oh, and she also goes by the name of Jamie Dieterich. She is TRULY a very worthy inductee into the NATRC Workers Hall of Fame.

## **Windstorm Sienna**

Owned, ridden and loved by Wayne Tolbert, R5

### **Acceptance Speech by Wayne Tolbert**

n NATRC, the accomplishments of any horse or rider are not done in isolation but with the help

and encouragement of other riding partners. I therefore want to express my thanks to some of the many partners with whom Sienna and I had the privilege to ride—Jack Britt, Mary Britt, Kim Cowart, Carl Strickland, Marty Findley, Debbie Jones, Cheri Jeffcoat, Lori Rand and many, many others. I especially want to thank Regina Broughton and Tango and Trish Cleveland and Deacon's Dolly for the many rides we did together.

Sienna competed in 3 NATRC regions (4, 5 and 6), encompassing 16 states and (counting one ride in 2002 in Ontario, Canada) in two countries. She competed 14 years—12 1/2 in the Open Division logging over 9,000 miles. I never worried about loading her up and heading across country to any ride, anywhere. Perhaps her single greatest asset was her steady reliability, going at one point 9 years without being pulled (and placing in all 112 of these Open Division rides). She completed 157 of the 160 rides we started. She traveled extremely well. She had a very calm demeanor in camp; never got loose or offered to run away and she ALWAYS ate and drank in camp and on the trail. She had great metabolics, only losing on average P & R points one ride every two years or so.

Sienna was the Region 5 High Point Novice horse in 1998, her first year in competition. She



subsequently won the President's Cup twice— in 2003 and 2005: earned 11 National Championships; won Open Sweepstakes at 20 rides and was a three time winner of the Jim Menefee Combined Horse and Horsemanship Award. In her 12 1/2 years as an Open horse Sienna completed 143 rides, placing first or second in 88. In addition, Sienna was the High Point Morgan in NATRC from 2001-2007 and 2009 and 2011. She was recognized by the American Morgan Horse Association as the High Point Distance Champion (2003-2007 and 2009-2010).

I always had complete confidence with her on the trail. Even when she got upset with "trail

dynamics" (or what she considered my abysmally poor trail management decisions) she never bucked, reared, spun or did anything evil or dangerous. When she spooked, which was rarely, she froze in place. We have encountered bear, wild hogs, bees, wild turkeys, and once even an escaped emu without incident. I have ridden many training/conditioning and trail marking rides alone without the slightest hesitation. However, during competition Sienna was not a perfect horse; she was herdbound and at times was challenging to ride. She would always obey but could make grudging compliance an art form.

Sienna had "heart". She never, ever offered to quit and in fact did her very best in the toughest rides winning Open Sweepstakes in four of the hottest and most humid rides we ever did.

Sienna is now happily retired. This is a decision I made after she fractured the coffin bone in her left hind in 2012 in the pasture. She is now sound, rideable and cavorts with our other horses but I decided not to risk re-injury by putting her back in competition. I feel she earned her retirement. She will always have a place on my farm and in my heart.

If an NATRC horse (that has competed) has been bought or sold, the mileage will not go with that horse unless the buyer or seller notifies the National Office that the horse has changed hands. We need the current and past owners' names, breed and registration number (if applicable) in order to move the mileage to the new owner.

If you change your name, please notify the National Office so we can put your mileage with your current name.

If you see that your name or your horse's name is incorrect in the *Hoof Print* – please notify the National Office and ask for a correction. The RMS is a separate system from the National database. If you corrected a name on the RMS System, it will NOT be corrected on the National database until you notify us of the change.




and they were off together for their first CTR in 2008. Since then Bill has been a valued member of NATRC!

## **Andrea Rogers -** by Janell Mount




Over the years I have grown to appreciate Andrea and her dedication to NATRC even more. We have ridden many rides together and just last year







# What a Ride!!

### Acceptance Speech by Esther Diaguila

ark Frost once said, "Life is not a journey to the grave with the intention of arriving safely in a pretty and well-preserved body. But rather, to skid in broadside, thoroughly used up, totally worn out, and loudly proclaiming .... WOW what a ride."

Wow! I am really here!, with each of you, right here where riders like Bev Tibbitts, Lisa Brooks, Shirley Sobol, James Keene, Wayne Tolbert, and Cheri Jeffcoat have stood and been awarded this awesome President's Cup. My life is good, but at this moment, it's amazing.

The journey that Dana and I have taken to reach this place is a testament to the philosophy of training and conditioning that makes NATRC the incredible equine sport that it is today. That I am standing here is due in large part to my husband, Paul; his patience and support were instrumental in this achievement.

In the beginning, if anyone had told me that I would be able to compete against the level of competition I was riding with in Region 5's Open Division, I might have laughed. But, the

truth is I took every opportunity that I was given to observe, learn from, and be trained by individuals like Cheri Jeffcoat, Marty Findley, Paula Riley, Regina Broughton and Trish Cleveland.

I'm not going to let you believe that Dana was on board with this at the beginning in March of 2015. At Spanish Trail, we were in the last 3 miles of the ride. Shirley Parker had created an interesting obstacle: backing around a bush, then making a 90° turn to continue backing between two trees. Dana was eager to get back to camp and decided she had no time for playing with bushes and trees. I had to insist. That's when she seemed to say, "If we have to do this, we're going to get it over with." Up, around the bush and through the trees at warp speed.

As soon as we had backed through the year. trees, she stopped and her attitude clearly said, "Are you happy now?"

Even after 5 years she can still surprise me. During the Georgia on My Mind Competition in 2014, a tiny drainage ditch became the Grand Canyon to Dana. She proceeded to leap it. I was not expecting this, and as she landed, my heels dug into her sides. This was the one and only time Dana ever bucked, and off I came. I think it surprised Dana as much as me!

NATRC riders once again showed the true sportsmanship they are known for. Several of the Open riders stopped to help; Paula Riley caught Dana and brought her back. Bill Moore, Patty Lucas and several others helped me back on my horse and stayed with me as we continued the ride and eventually came back to camp. I had several people offer pain meds, and one fellow rider loaned me a compression sleeve that helped to get me through the rest of the ride.

But I'm getting ahead of myself; I want to recognize some special friends that shared the journey with us this

Most of my Region 5 rides were with Regina Broughton and her Appaloosa gelding, Tango. I feel blessed that I had the opportunity to see this incredible team work together before Tango's retirement. More than once I had to put Dana behind Tango's big butt, and Dana knew when I did that she had really messed up. Riding with Regina was fun, and she knew how to help me with my pacing. When we were going up hills, Tango would go out front and just power up those inclines. When we needed to make time, Dana would go first with her big trot. I enjoyed our teamwork.

Patty Lucas was another wonderful ride partner. After getting off trail at the French Broad Classic on the Biltmore Estate this past year, we found ourselves 45 minutes behind maximum time. Patty never grumbled or whined, she was encouraging and cheerful as we cantered and galloped to make up time. At the P&R both horses pulsed down nicely, and we were actually able to make it in on middle time. Before this, I had been very insecure about

> cantering along with another horse, but with Patty's confidence and Dana's conditioning, our partnership grew even stronger.

> Riding with Bill Moore and Tommy Mitchell was enormous fun this year. I began to think of them as "The Boy's Club". Sometimes their trail riding was more like two cowboys out for a good time instead of a riding competition, but it gave me an opportunity to observe Bill's relationship with his Arab, Victory, and reflect on my partnership with Dana. Dana has learned to trust me. and I have learned to trust her. Sometimes you have to let your horse make decisions without trying to micro-manage.

> Going out of region was a bit scary for me. I'm so thankful that everyone welcomed Paul and me and treated us like we were long

lost family. A very special thanks to Trish Cleveland and Marilyn Marston for allowing me to ride with them at the PonyXpress Ride. This was a magical ride over rolling hills and through an old pony express station, painstakingly recreated. All fears evaporated, and Dana and I had a grand time! New friendships were made, Kricket Dooley, Patti Hicks, and so many others. Thanks, everyone, for such a warm welcome to an out-of-region rider.

Some experiences out of Region 5, like trying to comply with health reg-

ulations in every state and a few trips to the emergency room for both Paul and me were uncomfortable, but I would say the good experiences far outweighed the bad.

Now at the end of this you might be trying to decide if this is a fantasy trip, a reality show, or a horror tale.

So let me conclude with this quote from Zig Zigler.

"When obstacles arise, you change your direction to reach your goal; you do not change your decision to get there."



If you have been thinking about traveling out of region, trying to go for the "cup", attending more rides, or moving up to Open Division, just do it. It's a journey worth the ride, and what a ride it is!

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

n February 26, 2016, I lost my beloved Prime. A gate left open, two curious and trusting horses wandered into the road. and both had to be euthanized.

Only a few days before, on February 20. 2016 in Reno. Nevada, I had talked with so many people who knew Prime and had ridden him. I wanted to share this little tribute with all who knew him.

His athletic ability was well known, but perhaps you were not aware of


some of his personal attributes. Raised and ridden by Bill Hinkebein, he earned three National Championships and multiple Region 6 awards. In 2006 he finished 63 miles of the Tevis Cup. sound, pulled only because of time constraints.

On to his second owner. Cheri Jeffcoat, where his manners were polished. With Cheri, he was our Presidents Cup winner (2010), Jim Menefee Combined horse and Horsemanship winner (2009-10), plus earned four more National Championships.

I entered his life when my Arab could no longer compete

because of a debilitating condition, and my husband was tired of my crying about not being able to go to NATRC rides and compete in Open. Prime was my 9th horse

> to start in NATRC and in some ways my biggest challenge. He only trusted Cheri and himself. Frequently at Region 5 rides if she was the iudge, she had to hold her arms down by her sides when aivina directions or he would side pass left and right as she talked. As we worked out our relationship, he won five more



National Championships, the Bev Tibbitts High Average Award, and the NATRC High Point Lightweight horse in 2013.

After the first year we bonded to such an extent that I could walk up to him in the pasture and halter him. To those who really knew him, this was the ultimate acknowledgement of trust where Prime was concerned. This magnificent Missouri Fox Trotter always had my heart. Raised by a General George Patton, trained by a Hillary Clinton, he finally spent his last years with me, Alice in Wonderland.

Ctudent loans are available Oup to \$5,000 per person per year, at the discretion of the NATRC National Board of Directors, after proper application has been submitted.


Preference will be given to a full-time student who has been a member of NATRC or whose family has been an active member for at least three vears. Consideration will also be given to a student or a student's family who has been an active member of NATRC for less than three years but more than six months.

A loan will be made based upon financial need, scholastic achievement, and character of the applicant as determined by the Student Loan/Scholarship Committee.

A loan is to be repaid in monthly installments with an annual interest rate of 3% charged on that loan, beginning not later than six months following graduation or when the recipient ceases to be a full-time student.

It was not until September 2014 in Troy, Alabama that I found others like myself. Others willing to go out in the cold and rain to feed their addictions. To care for it. To

treat it better than we treat ourselves.

I have now found a support group that I am willing to share myself with. To consider my family. If you are reading this, you are that supportive family. Thank you. Together we are stronger and better for it.

It is my understanding that the first step is to admit you have this addiction and the second step is to figure out what you are going to do about it. So, here it goes. I, Victoria Light, am addicted to horses and these are my goals:

- 1) Creating communication between myself and my horse. This includes trust and respect in both directions.
- 2) Creating an environment around me of education for myself, my fellow riders and our
- 3) Creating attainable goals for me and my horse while maintaining an atmosphere of fun. For only through pushing past our comfort zone do we improve ourselves.

I don't ever think I will nor do I want to kick this addiction, but I feel that with the support of my NATRC family all of these goals can be accomplished.

t's the Way You Ride the Trail That Counts" – Dale Evans
One of the most critical aspects of ride management and planning is the selection of a trailmaster and the layout/design of the trails themselves. Each ride location presents is own unique set of challenges and opportunities. A good trailmaster can take on those challenges and give the riders the opportunity to fully enjoy the ride experience.

All of the required aspects of ride trail design are included in the Rule Book and Management Manual. There are a number of things that the trailmaster must consider when determining how to best use what they have to work with at a ride location. They must consider the distances required for the Novice, CP and Open divisions as well as what pace to set for each group within the guidelines, taking into consideration the terrain, weather etc. They must consider where to locate the P&R stops, at what points the judges will see the riders on trail, and how best to plan and allow for the required two metabolic checks and soundness checks per day for the veterinary judge. They must also include at least four checkpoints on the trail to allow riders to orient themselves. Perhaps most importantly of all, they must make the trail markings distinct and obvious to the riders. That is a full plate...and it takes an organized and resourceful individual to put it

- all together.
  Here are a few
  tips and techniques to keep in
  mind when planning the trail for
  your ride:
- Keeping the divisions closer together on trail gives more opportunities for judging. Adding in a side loop for the Open riders
- or a short cut for Novice and CP somewhere between 5 and 10 miles out can help to keep the Novice, CP, and Open groups closer together, allowing the judges to complete an observation and more easily get ahead to catch the riders at another point along the trail. If the two groups are allowed to get farther and farther apart, with the first Open rider on minimum time and the last Novice or CP possibly running on maximum, it becomes very difficult to finish and get to the next judging point in time.
- Plan where the vet judge will have good terrain for a soundness check on trail. Consider where you will place the metabolic checks, taking into consideration any possible back up or hold times occurring that could create an un-level playing field for those observations.
- Consider locations of access points for judging and time how long it takes to drive from place to place.
- Consider where and how horses will have access to water on trail. Are there safe natural sources or will you need to haul water out to places on trail?
- Remember that although the trailmaster is tasked with identifying/planning possible observation points, they do not design or come up with the observation itself. Give the judge

- something to work with and let them decide what they will do at the location.
- When planning for P&R stops, consider the weather conditions for the ride. Will it be hot? If so, a spot in the shade or open to a breeze is better. Also consider the need for room for P&R crews to move around the horses safely. Can the ambulance trailer get to the location to pick up pulled horses if necessary?
- When you are finished marking trail, consider having a person unfamiliar with the trails come to ride with you. Put that rider in front of you and give them the map. If they miss a turn or have places they are unsure where to go, that will tell you where you need to add ribbons or a sign/marker. Very often when we become familiar with a trail, we are no longer able to look at it with those new eyes. What is obvious to us may be confusing when you don't know the trails.
- Have contingency plans. Plan ahead for possible alternate routes around areas that can become dangerous when very wet, and pre-figure the ride timing in the event you may need to reduce the speed for safety. This pre-planning will make the ride weekend much less stressful when Mother Nature throws a wrench in the works.

Remember that the trail should be challenging in terms of terrain/miles but easy to follow with markings and map. We are a distance competitive trail sport, with 85% of the score for the horse based on the evaluation of its condition and soundness. The trail should therefore be challenging enough to allow for separation of the horses by the veterinary judge rewarding those that are conditioned and prepared for the ride.







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### RULE PROPOSALS CARRIED FORWARD FROM NBOD MEETING 2-18-2016

### Addition of a Non-Competing Adult Supporting Membership

### **SECTION 1 - GENERAL**

#### A. Membership

- 1. Any person interested in the purposes of this organization may be eligible for membership upon proper application and payment of the required dues.
  - a. Yearly Membership
    - (1) Adult Membership: Any person 18 years of age or over.
    - (2) Junior Membership: Any person under the age of 18 as of the beginning of the ride year.
    - (3) Family Membership: A household of one or two adults and children under the age of 18 as of January 1.
    - (4) Associate Membership: Any firm, partnership, group, or any other business sufficiently interested in the promotion of the horse and horse-back riding, upon proper application and the annual payment of dues.
    - (5) Supporting Membership: Any person 18 years of age or over. Not eligible for individual ride awards unless the non-member rider fees are paid at the ride. Not eligible for year end and mileage awards unless Adult membership fee is paid before the end of the ride year.
  - b. Lifetime Membership
    - (1) Single Lifetime Membership: Any person of any age.
    - (2) Family Lifetime Membership: A household of one or two adults at time membership is obtained and any children under the age of 18 as of January 1.
- 2. Each membership, except lifetime, shall be for a period of twelve months commencing January 1 each year regardless of the month in which payment of dues is received. All membership fees are due on January 1 each year.
- 3. Each Adult, Supporting, and Single Lifetime Membership is entitled to one vote. Each Family and Family Lifetime Membership is entitled to two votes.

**Rationale:** Older riders who quit competing can easily be lost to NATRC membership. Other members who have joined, even for a year or two, and are not competing may not renew for other reasons, economic, family changes, horse issues, etc. A less expensive membership could encourage them to remain. Suggest \$40.00 for supporting membership.

Note: No monies should be returned to the regions for the supporting memberships. No loss would be incurred by NATRC.

### **Hoof Protection/Leg Protection**

### **SECTION 5 - THE RIDE**

### E. Hoof Protection/ Leg Protection

- 1. There are no shoeing restrictions.
- 2. All types of hoof boots that provide sole protection are allowed. However, any attached strap, keeper, gaiter or accessory must not extend above the pastern. Socks and wraps under hoof boots or any of their parts are allowed if they do not extend above the pastern. The judges may request to observe the area covered by the attached strap, keeper, gaiter, or accessory.
- 3. (Move from 5 F 3) Protective devices, such as bell boots or wraps, are not permissible on the legs of horses except for hoof sole protections as allowed under Section 5.E.2. The leg is defined as all structures above and including the coronet.

### And change to:

Protective devices, such as bell boots, splint boot or leg wraps are not permissible on the legs of horses except as part of hoof sole protection as allowed in 5 E 2. The leg is defined as all structures above and including the coronet.

### F. Tack

- 1. Riders must use a saddle and headgear with attached reins. The type of saddle, headgear with reins, and other equipment is at the discretion of the rider within the bounds of good horsemanship. However, no inhumane method of restraint is to be used.
- 2. Trail gear desired by the competitor during the ride will be carried on the horse. No part of a rider's wearing apparel is considered trail gear.
- Protective devices, such as bell boots or wraps, are not permissible on the legs of horses except for hoof sole protections as allowed under Section 5.E.2.
   The leg is defined as all structures above and including the coronet.

**Rationale:** (1) Socks and wraps under hoof boots or their accessories have been considered leg protection. Is it more appropriate to consider these as hoof boot protection?

(2) Moving #3 from the current section (5 F) on tack to the rules on shoeing and hoof protection makes more sense.

### **Junior Competitor Proposal**

### **SECTION 4 - DIVISIONS, CLASSES AND ELIGIBILITY**

### B. Classes

- 3. Junior
  - a. Age 10 through 17. The rider must be 10 years old to enter competition; thereafter the age of a junior shall be determined by whatever their age is as of the beginning of the ride year and this age shall continue throughout that ride year.
  - Juniors may not compete in Novice Heavyweight, Novice Lightweight, or Senior classes. Juniors may compete in Open Heavyweight or Open Lightweight classes if weight requirements are met.

- c. Juniors (See Section 4 B3a) may not ride stallions.
- d. No weight requirements apply if competing in Junior Class.

### Change to:

- 3. Junior
  - a. Age 8 through 17. The rider must be 8 years old to enter competition; thereafter the age of a junior shall be determined by whatever their age is as of the beginning of the ride year and this age shall continue throughout that ride year. Juniors under the age of 16 must be accompanied by an adult (18 years or over) on the trail unless the junior rider has at least 300 competition miles or has completed a minimum of 10 rides of any ride type.
  - b. Juniors may not compete in Novice Heavyweight, Novice Lightweight, or Senior classes. Juniors may compete in Open Heavyweight or Open Lightweight lasses if weight requirements are met.
  - e. b. Juniors (See Section 4 B3a) may not ride stallions.
  - d.c.No weight requirements apply if competing in Junior Class.

**Rationale:** Multiple families have indicated this has been a large factor in their either not joining NATRC, or stepping away from NATRC and going to other distance riding organizations so that their children could compete with them. This proposal would reduce those losses in the future.

### RULE CLARIFICATIONS CARRIED FORWARD

### Ride Results and Office Procedure

### **SECTION 2 - SANCTIONED RIDES AND CLINICS**

- A. Rides
  - 2. Fees
    - b. A rider's fee as established by the Board of Directors will be sent with the ride results within 7 days following the ride (count each rider who officially starts, see Section 5 A2). After receipt by the NATRC office of all scores, points will be recorded on behalf of the competitor who is a current member or who joins at any time during a year in which that rider has competed in a ride.

### Change to:

- A. Rides
  - 2. Fees
    - b. Rider fees and notification of completion of ride results will be sent to the NATRC national office within 7 working days following the ride. All riders who officially start the ride shall be counted. The NATRC national office will download all scores and then record rider's points and mileage. The rider's fee amount will be established by the Board of Directors on an annual basis.

**Rationale**: The proposed change would better describe the current office procedure as well as emphasize the 7-day post ride time frame to submit ride results.

### Clarify Definition of Ride Year

### **SECTION 2 - SANCTIONED RIDES AND CLINICS**

- A. Rides
  - 1. Sanctioning
    - d. Ride year will end immediately after the second Sunday in November.

### **SECTION 1 - AWARDS**

- B. Annual Awards
  - 1. General
    - e. Ride year will end immediately after the second Sunday in November.

**Rationale:** Eligibility for year-end awards is based on membership by the end of the ride year as opposed to the calendar year.

The age of Juniors is defined by the <u>beginning</u> of the ride year, Section 4 B 3 a. "The rider must be 10 years old to enter competition; thereafter the age of a junior shall be determined by whatever their age is as of the beginning of the ride year and this age shall continue throughout that ride year."

If the ride year ends "immediately after the second Sunday in November," it's unclear when the beginning of the ride year is. Deleting "immediately after" in two places would give a more precise definition of the end of the ride year and thus also to the beginning of the ride year.

# Points Distribution Clarification

### **SECTION 9 - AWARDS**

- C. Point Distribution
  - 1. Disqualified or pulled horse and rider receive no points. (Move to 3)
  - Points shall be based on the number of starters in a Class according to the Points Distribution Table.
  - DO horse and rider receive no points. DO participants are not counted as starters in a ride. DO horses and riders receive no points.
  - 3. Disqualified or pulled horse and rider receive no points.
  - 4. The Open Sweepstakes winner will receive points equal to the highest points awarded in any of the three Open classes. The Novice Sweepstakes winner will receive points equal to the highest points awarded in any of the three Novice classes.
  - The Sweepstakes winner will receive points, in addition to other points won for horse, as follows: 3 points for a Type AA ride, 2 points for a Type A ride, one point for a Type B ride.
  - Points earned in one class will not be added to points earned in another class by the same horse or rider.

**Rationale:** To define how points are assigned and to introduce the points distribution table. Points Distribution Table is located directly following #6 above.

MINUTES. November 14, 2015. Call for corrections. Meroshnekoff moved to accept minutes, Rand seconded. Motion approved.




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
