

In Remembrance

William (Bill) Hinkebein

April 18, 1942 - July 13, 2023 | Chillicothe, Missouri

William G. Hinkebein (Bill), oldest son of Sylvester and Stella (Pratt) Hinkebein was born on April 18, 1942 in St. Louis, Missouri, and passed away on July 13, 2023 at North Kansas City Hospital.

Bill was raised on a farm outside of Farmington, Missouri, with his parents and six younger brothers. He was educated in Missouri, graduating from the University of Missouri with two BS degrees, one in Animal Husbandry and the other Ag Education. He also earned his Master's Degree and Specialist Degree in Agriculture Education.

He started his teaching career in Windsor, Missouri, in 1966, went on to a vocational school and eventually moved to Chillicothe and taught agriculture at North Central Missouri College (NCMC). He stayed at NCMC as a full time teacher for 25 years and still remained as a part time educator up until his death.

When Bill retired, he had accumulated 37.5 years of full time classroom teaching. He enjoyed his students and wanted to instill in them a love of agriculture.

Bill started the equine program at NCMC and always hoped to show his students the fun of riding horses. For over 20 years, Bill, with the assistance of agriculture students at NCMC, provided horseback riding classes to handicapped students in the Trenton and Chillicothe areas.

On June 18, 1966 Bill married Jeanne Pfaff and they had four children. Their first, William, was premature and passed shortly after birth. They have seven grandchildren and a host of nieces and nephews. Bill and Jeanne spent many hours

attending their children's and grandchildren's sporting events, band concerts, play productions, and 4H



horse shows and competitions. They considered their family to be their greatest blessing.

In 1985, Bill began competing in NATRC with Missouri Fox Trotter horses he bred. Through the years he accumulated over 14,000 miles in competition. He earned numerous awards including achieving National Championships on 10 different horses, (winning the Bev Robert's National Horsemanship Champion Award *twice*). Upon receiving the award, Bill said, "This is the hardest

thing I've ever done." In NATRC's 63 years of existence, he is the sole holder of this distinction.

His successes included winning the President's Cup, NATRC's highest award.

Such successes involved an additional minimum of 14,000 miles of training and conditioning and having riding skills needed to attain this level of merit.

To his fellow competitors, It was no surprise that, as an educator, he became an approved horsemanship judge. As a competitor, he knew the in's and out's of competition and had a keen eye for judging.

Two of his greatest achievements was having his daughter, Elizabeth ride with him and win first place in Region 6 Youth Division. Several years later two granddaughters would ride with him. At the end of the second season, Bill, Jessica and Josie attained their National Championships, and Jessica was number one in the nation with Josie being second.

In addition to NATRC competitions, Bill and his family attended a yearly trail ride held around Duke, Missouri, in the beautiful

Ozarks. The entire family still attends this ride. In 2023 Bill, his wife, Jeanne, and their three children, received the 45 years of attendance award.



2024 Appv'd Rule Changes

Changes are in RED.

EXTEND COMBINED WEIGHT CLASSES FOR ONE YEAR

SECTION 4 - DIVISIONS, CLASSES, AND ELIGIBILITY

3. Classes

 Heavyweight and Lightweight classes are combined into an Adult class on a temporary basis for the 2023-2024 ride year and will revert to 2022 rules unless extended by the National Board of Directors.

APPENDICES CHANGES MAY BE MADE ADMINISTRATIVELY

INSIDE FRONT COVER

Except for emergency actions and editorial corrections to published rules, all proposed rule changes/additions must be presented to the NATRCTM membership on the national website at least 45 days prior to a vote of the NATRC Board of Directors.

Changes to Rule Book Appendices may be made administratively, but 1) must be approved by the NATRC Board of Directors, and 2) changes must be posted on the national website 30 days prior to implementation or as soon as is practical.

NATIONAL LEISURE AWARDS

SECTION 9 - AWARDS

Annual Awards

- 1. General
 - c. Only the first 16 rides in Open Division, or 12 rides in Novice, or Competitive Pleasure Division officially started (See Section 5A2) in a ride year will count toward national awards. Type AA ride counts as 1½ rides; Type A ride counts as 1 ride; Type B ride counts as ½ ride. The horse and rider team shall be considered officially started when timed out on the first day of the ride
 - d. A horse/rider does not have to officially start 16 Open Division or 12 in Novice, or Competitive Pleasure Division rides in order to qualify.
 - h. All rides in Leisure Division in a ride year will count toward Leisure national awards.
- 2. National Awards

HIGH POINT LEISURE TEAM: Points shall be credited to riders for the purpose of determining annual high point awards in each Leisure Class (i.e., Experienced, Adult, Junior), first through sixth place. The horse and rider team shall be considered officially started when timed out on the ride day.

Age of Horses

- (1) Horses competing for High Point Leisure Team award must be at least 48 months of age.
 - (a) Registered horses are considered 48 months of age as of actual foaling date on the registration papers.
 - (b) Unregistered horses are considered to be of eligible age if they have a "full mouth" (all permanent incisors having erupted and in wear) as determined by a licensed veterinarian.

COMPLETION ONLY (Rule Clarification)

SECTION 6 - JUDGING

- H. Completion Only: A horse and rider, for the purpose of "Completion Only", are considered a team. "Completion Only" for one automatically constitutes "Completion Only" of the other.
 - 1. A horse and rider, for the purpose of "Completion Only", are considered a team. "Completion Only" for one automatically constitutes "Completion Only" of the other.
 - A horse that checks out grade 3 lame (obviously consistently lame) or with other factors that that would limit its ability to continue at the end of a ride, will not place, but may receive completion points and mileage only at the discretion of the veterinary judge or Leisure judge.
 - 3. A horse and rider team arriving more than 30 minutes after the maximum time will not place but will receive completion points and mileage only.

PLACINGS MUST BE ANNOUNCED (Rule Clarification)

SECTION 9 - AWARDS

A. Ride Awards

- 2. Each division shall include first through sixth placings-place in each horse class offered and in each horsemanship class offered., with the exception of Leisure Division as noted below.
- 8. Placings and Awards awards based on NATRC scoring must be publicly presented publicly and announced individually at the immediate conclusion of the ride.

2025 Proposed Rule Changes

To be voted on by NBOD in July 2024 | Changes are in RED

#1a: COMBINE DIVISION WEIGHT CLASSES INTO ADULT CLASS (A TEMPORARY ONE-YEAR ACTION)

4.B.1. Heavyweight and Lightweight classes are combined into an Adult class on a temporary basis for the 2025 ride year and will revert to 2022 rules unless extended by the National Board of Directors.

Rationale: Continue current year-to-year approval process. In the 2023 ride season, merging the Heavyweight and Lightweight classes into a single ADULT class yielded the desired results. There were many fewer tiny classes (<3 competitors) and while there were some large classes (>10 competitors), the number wasn't large and was still much less than experienced in NATRC historically. Heavyweights may be at a disadvantage competing with lightweights, but without the merge many classes essentially would have no real competition. By making the change temporary, it is slightly easier to reverse this change if ridership improves.

#1b: COMBINE DIVISION WEIGHT CLASSES INTO ADULT CLASS (MAKE PERMANENT)

4.B.1. Heavyweight and Lightweight classes are combined into an Adult class

Rationale: Same as above except last sentence. By making the change permanent, competitors know this is what to expect going forward for some time.


#2: VETERINARY JUDGING


SECTION 6 - JUDGING

- A. Procedures: The judges may act together and discuss individual entrants throughout the course of the ride.
 - 2. Start of Competition
 - a. For the purposes of scoring maneuvering trail/behavior, soundness and horsemanship, the horse and rider shall be considered in competition from the moment that the horse is presented to the judges for preliminary examination.
 - 5. Final Examination: There must be a final examination (including condition, soundness, and maneuvering trail/behavior) of all horses by the veterinary and horsemanship judges after the completion of the final day's ride.
- B. Veterinary Judging: Judges shall not discriminate against any animal due to conformation or type as long as the animal performs satisfactorily. Horses are to be evaluated on the following three criteria: condition, soundness and maneuvering trail/behavior. Leisure Division does not have to adhere to these scoring categories.
 - 3. Maneuvering Trail/Behavior 15%: The evaluation of maneuvering trail/behavior shall include, but not be limited to, the following: disposition, response to rider, kicking, head tossing, prancing, standing for examination and mounting, buddying up, trail wise, etc.
- D. Leisure Division. Horses will be evaluated on maneuvering trail/behavior. Riders will be evaluated on equitation and partnership with the horse. Safety may be scored

Rationale: Riders have expressed concerns for many years about the heavy scoring in the trail ability/manners section of the horse scorecard. Our veterinarians should focus on what they are expertly and professionally trained to do and that is to judge metabolic conditioning, soundness and behavior. A task force made recommendations for a pilot program which was accepted by the National Board in 2022 to change the name to "Maneuvering Trail / Behavior" and to revise the scoring criteria. The pilot project has been successful. The name of the bottom section of the horse scorecard now needs to be changed in the Rule Book. The scorecard itself will be consistent with the Rule Book.

#3: MAKE RIDE SWEEPSTAKES AWARD A COMINATION AWARD AND AWARD POINTS TO HORSE

SECTION 9 - AWARDS

- A. Ride Awards
 - 4. The horse and rider team with the highest combined (horse and horsemanship) score from the Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice Divisions shall be the recipients of the Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice Sweepstakes Awards.
- C. Point Distribution
 - 4. The Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice Sweepstakes winners will receive the highest points possible for their horses' placings based on the number of starters in the largest class of their respective division.
 - 5. The Sweepstakes winner will receive points to the horse, in addition to other points won for horse, as follows: 3 points for a Type AA ride, 2 points for a Type A, 1 point for a Type B.

Rationale: Making Sweepstakes a combination award of both horse and horsemanship allows the best team to take high honors. Allowing all extra points to go to the horse follows NATRC tradition. This also enables more points to go to the horse for a National Championship which is a horse award. Example: There is a full class (6) of ADULT competitors and three (3) competitors in the JUNIOR class in a Type-A ride. A JUNIOR who took 1st in horse and 3rd in horsemanship has the highest combined score and wins Sweepstakes. Without the Sweepstakes award, the JUNIOR horse would earn 10 points and horsemanship would earn 6 points. Sweepstakes awards the JUNIOR more points in two ways:

- 1. The ADULT class was larger, and the JUNIOR beat all the ADULT horses. As the top ADULT horse earned 16 points, so did the JUNIOR horse. The JUNIOR horsemanship points are left unchanged at 6.
- 2. Because this is a Type-A ride, the JUNIOR's horse score is increased by an additional 2 points; that is, the final JUNIOR points are 18 (16+2) for horse (1st place) and 6 for horsemanship.

#4: NATRC'S HIGHEST AWARD

SECTION 9 - AWARDS

- B. Annual Awards
 - 1. National Awards
 - a. NATIONAL "JIM MENEFEE" AWARD (Combined Horse & Horsemanship): This award will be presented annually to the overall high point horse and rider team in the Open Division.
 - b. PRESIDENT'S CUP: This award will be presented annually to the overall high point horse in the Open Division.

Rationale: This changes which award gets top honors and speaks at national convention. This makes the primary focus of the top award to emphasize the partnership achieved by the horse and rider team. Our highest award would reflect the team that has demonstrated a fit, sound, well behaved equine, which with its rider, can successfully perform all the expected trail tasks better than any other team. The top horse would still receive an important award, but our top award will identify our top horse and top rider. Historically the winner of the President's Cup is usually, but not always, the winner of the Jim Menefee Memorial Award high combo). This change has our top honor recognizing the best of everything we do in our sport.

#5: STABLING

SECTION 5 - THE RIDE

- B. Stabling
 - 4. Stabling option *not allowed* during competition as primary containment.
 - a. Hobbling of any kind
 - b. Portable panels that are not securely anchored to a trailer or a tree
 - c. Electric fencing
 - d. Staking out in any manner
 - e. Stallions in portable panels
 - 5. Stallions: Stallions must be double tied...

Rationale: NATRC strives to offer the safest means of care to our horses and this rule requires some clarification.

Acceptance Speech by Sherry Garnes

Good evening, everyone!

My name is Sherry Garnes, and I am from Asheville, NC. My horse's name is Beau. Beau is a 17-year-old Spotted Saddle Horse. Barry and I joke around that we believe in Beau's previous life he was a Thoroughbred. He is fun, fast, and furious. The perfect match for me.

My world started revolving around horses was when my dad bought me a Shetland pony, Dan, for my first birthday. I grew up with this pony living at my grandparents' house and

would visit him often as a child. My grandparents downsized their farm and sold Dan when I was a teenager.

As I became an adult, I left that part of my life behind. I became busy with work and kids. During those years I would always be drawn to horses when they crossed my path and felt a huge connection to them. I never imagined I would own one again, until a gentleman by the name of Doug DeRosa walked into one of our stores and asked if we were hiring. Doug came to work for us and soon after that I discovered he

owned a horse farm. Doug invited Barry and me down to see his farm and the horses. I will never forget the peace and joy I felt at their farm.

Charmaine DeRosa, Doug's wife at the time, invited me to go trail rid-

ing at the Biltmore Estate. We loaded her horses and off we went. She was so gracious to let me ride her beautiful Rocky Mountain Horse, Rocky. About 5 miles into the ride, I turned to her and said, "I must figure out how to do this every single day for the rest of my life."

And that I did, with the enormous help from my husband. Three weeks later, I had Beau, a trailer to haul him in and a place to board him. I was living my BEST life; it was like a dream come true.

TAKE PRIDE IN YOUR RIDE!

Beau came to our family as a 4year old. I found him in Flemmingsburg, Kentucky. He was owned by one of the workers at a barn. The worker's dad had cancer and he had to sell Beau to pay for his father's chemotherapy. Beau had been his transportation back and forth to the barn. He was very sad to see Beau leave the farm. I promised him I would take good care of him and that I would keep his name. Beau was boarded with three other horses and settled in well at his new farm. He was 10 minutes from my home, and I was able to visit him every day.

Charmaine invited me to join their riding group. One of the ladies in the group was Mary Britt. I loved her from the start. Mary took me under

her wing and off we went. If you knew Mary, it wasn't just a trail ride, it was always an NATRC training ride. Mary along with two other individuals started NATRC on the east coast. I felt extremely lucky to have landed in this group.

I decided to do my first NATRC ride in March 2012 at Uwharrie National Forest in Troy, NC. There were five of the Waynesville girls that competed in the competition. I went to the first-time riders meeting. Courtney Woodall was in charge of it and I remember her saying your horse will be a total idiot for an hour and then


will settle down, well.... that was not the case with Beau, he was out of his mind the entire ride. We had A LOT of work to do, but I loved it! We went home, did our homework, and

did a few rides a year for the next couple years. Beau was settling down and becoming somewhat of a well-mannered citizen.

In July of 2015, Mary passed away from pancreatic cancer. There is not a week that goes by that I don't think of her. She gave me my foundation and confidence in this sport. I know she is looking down and smiling BIG!

We moved up to the Open Division and did a few rides. It didn't go well for us with saddle fit issues, plus Beau developed COPD. I decided to give him a break from competition and start one of my other horses in NATRC. During this time, my daughter-in-law, Amber, was riding Beau a couple of times a week. They did an LeD at Mingo Trails. Beau had given Amber a lot of confidence with her riding. I was very proud of the two of them. Amber was pregnant with Logan and decided that she didn't want to ride during her pregnancy. During this time Roo, the horse I was competing on, had an injury in the pasture and was unable to compete in CTR or endurance. I had gone 3 months without riding, and that was not my plan.



Barry was probably exhausted with my not so good attitude and somewhat politely said, "Get yourself together: put Beau back to work and see what you can do."

I made a plan!

First, I bought a Specialized Saddle and found the finest saddle fitters and forever friends, Tiger and Jeanne Steele. Beau had been through four saddles before we met Tiger and Jeanne. They played a big part in our success.

Second, I put us on a 4-month conditioning plan. I did 3-4 rides a week using a heart rate monitor. I logged all our training rides so I could track our progress.

In March of 2021, we did our first comeback Open Division ride at Mingo Trails. The weather was warm for that time of the year. I knew Beau would struggle with the heat and humidity. We came back into camp for the P&Rs, and I was able to hose him off before going back out. Beau finished the 2-day open ride with a few points lost on metabolics. I was encouraged and

hopeful we could compete in the Open Division for 2021. Beau completed eight open rides and received a National Championship in 2021. I was over the moon!

In 2022, he received his 2nd National Championship and the Bev Tibbetts Grand Champion award. This was a big year for us, Beau learned how to take care of himself on the trail and I learned how to support him when he needed it. We really came together in 2022.

I made our ride schedule for 2023. I added a few more out of region rides to the calendar. Taking one ride at a time was our plan. Our first three rides of the season were okay, nothing spectacular. The next three rides were mountainous and technical and he won sweepstakes at all three. Beau loves the

mountainous, technical trails.

At the end of May, Barry, Summer, Tucker, Beau and I packed up and headed for Kanopolis and the Air Force Academy ride. Eleven R5 riders and volunteers went on this adventure. The ride was really warm and humid, and we placed 3rd there. We stayed over at Kannapolis for the week before the Air Force ride. It was so much fun! Ty and Debbie McCullough were our tour guides for that week. They received an A+. Beau discovered prairie grass and loved it!

Off to the Air Force Academy, it did not disappoint! The weather was cool, the grass was lush and green, creeks were clear and flowing and the vibrant wildflowers were gorgeous. I learned a huge lesson at this ride, always check the shoe if you think there might be a rock. Beau did not lose any points the entire ride until vet out on Sunday where he was grade 2 lame. I felt he was a little off inside the 2-mile marker on Sunday and did not stop to check as we were riding on max time. When I got back to camp there was a stone lodged in one of his shoes. Lesson learned!

On Thursday when we arrived, the park service came by and let us know that the rattlesnakes like to hang out at the edge of the brambles and advised us to make sure the truck and trailer got closed up. I was diligent about this throughout the weekend because I am not a snake person.

We headed out on Monday morning to overnight in Kanopolis. At our second fuel stop, I got out of the truck, glanced back at the bed of the truck, and couldn't believe my eyes as there was a LARGE snake crawling out of the hole in the top of the bed rail. I was screaming, the trucker in the bay beside me was screaming, "SNAKE!" We were not moving. Barry wondered, "What on earth is going on?" I directed Barry to remove the snake from the bed of the truck. The only tools I could find for Barry to use were a broom and a plastic fence stake, which did not work as the snake retreated to the underneath of the truck. You can only imagine the 20-minute scene we had created at this truck stop with our snake removal efforts. Our next stop was Kanopolis. We can hope the snake (Continued on page 14)





was rehomed on the prairie.

When we came home from this ride, it was my birthday. My daughter in-law, Maddie, had the best birthday present EVER on my kitchen bar. She had written a children's book, "Where Is Beau," and had it published. I have copies here if you would like to take one.

Our next ride was the Jesse James Rideout. With the heat wave in the mid-west, I was unsure of attending this ride. The weekend forecast was showing a cool down, so we decided to try it. On Thursday when we came through Kansas City, my truck thermometer read 105 degrees F. It was still hot and humid for us during the ride. John and management did a great job with all the water that was provided on the trail. We were able to hose and sponge often, and that allowed us to complete the ride. Beau finished 5th and lost some metabolic points. This was Beau's hardest ride of the season. He came home to some muchneeded R&R.

The fall season started out with Ride the Edge, which is always a great ride. The week after, we headed to the 50th anniversary of the Indian Cave ride. What an honor to be there for that occasion. Everyone said you will love it if it doesn't rain. There was only a slight chance of rain in the forecast, I thought no biggie. Well on Friday evening we received 1.5 inches of rain. It was really slick going out on Saturday morning, but after about 4 miles, Beau

said, "Mom, we've got this." He figured it out. Beau took sweepstakes.

Barry had agreed early in the season to manage the Biltmore ride. I had managed this ride for the last 9 years. It was truly remarkable how this ride went flawlessly. Many many thanks to Barry, volunteers, and judges. There is talk around that he should maybe be the ride manager going forward. We'll see. Beau also won sweepstakes at Biltmore.

I felt like Region 6 needed to find me a permanent residence, I was there so much. Big Hill was our last out-of-region ride for the season. The weather was perfect on Saturday, cool and crisp, perfect for Beau. Sunday not so much - 38 degrees with pouring down rain.

Beau discovered hedge apples (from the Osage Orange tree) with our travels to the midwest. He always prefers to be out front except when there are hedge apples on the

trail. About halfway through the ride on Sunday, he decided it would be better for Cricket to go out front. I thought it might be all the water on the trail, but little did I know it was only so he could grab a bite of a hedge apple and then proceed to catch up to Cricket. He attempted this a few more times until I caught on to his tricks. Beau vetted out grade 1 lame at the end of the ride. His final ride was the following weekend.

We left Kansas on Monday, stayed at Patty Lucas's beautiful farm in Alabama

for a couple of days and let Beau run around before the Southern Trails ride. He vetted in sound, and he was strong for the entire ride. This ended our 2023 season.

During the fall ride season, my dad's health was declining. He was one of my biggest fans, he kept up with every ride. I would walk into the hospital to visit him, and he would introduce me. The nurses and doctors would say, "Are you the one with the top horse in the nation?"

This happened numerous times. When I came back from Alabama, Dad looked at me and asked, "Did you get it done?" He passed away the week after that.

Barry Garnes was my utmost support person all year - anything I needed he had already thought of. I see a lot of ski trips in my future to repay him.

Writing this speech made me reflect over the last 3 years.

This sport has given me so much, one of those is my brother from a different mother.... Tommy Mitchell. Tommy and Red have traveled many trails with Beau and me. And we have many more to look forward to.

Jennifer Mulligan was patient with me when we need to sponge and sponge and sponge again.

Our NATRC judges have truly made me a better rider.

The support I received from my NATRC family during the fall season



will never be forgotten. It is so true - it's the people we meet along the way who help us appreciate the journey.

By far, the biggest award from this year is the relationship and bond I have with Beau; there are no words to define the trust between us. I will hold onto it for the rest of my life.

And many thanks to God for giving me this gift. Thank You!

2023 National Honorary Awards

Jim Menefee Lifetime Achievement Bev Roberts

Growing up in an Army family, Bev lived all across the country and abroad. She put herself through college (M.S. in Mechanical Engineering) and has worked in the auto, oil and gas, and nuclear industries. Through it all, horses, art and hard work were a constant.

Bev's NATRC career began in the early 1970s after she read an article in *Western Horseman* magazine and rode Open at the Rendezvous Ride in Wyoming. She had a blast and has been a tireless contributing member ever since.

She competed on a number of different horses throughout the past 50+ years and 8,000 miles of NATRC, earning Open national championships on five different horses, 19 International, national and regional championships and top sixes in NATRC, AERC and AHA.

Competing is not all. She has been manager of the Arkansas Traveler, a rules interpreter, secretary for vet and horsemanship judges, awards chair and P&R worker. She worked with the national safety chair to better organize safety data.

In 2007, following up on a suggest-

ion that NATRC should market and brand itself more aggressively, Bev became Marketing/Publicity Chair and put together a marketing plan with representatives from each region. She created our branding specs, submitted press releases to periodicals around the country on such topics as President's Cup winners, major rule changes, and the introduction of LeD (for which she coined the acronym). She designed numerous brochures, booth-in-a box panels, flyers, and convention ads; has been the NATRC ad designer, E-News Chair, 2012 Raffle Chair, and Web Master. On the Hoof Print Advisory Committee, besides writing articles and illustrating Trail Tips, Bev designed countless ads for our sponsors. She was added to the Workers Hall of Fame in 2011. Bev wrote many parts of, and did the layout and numerous illustrations for, the current Rider's Manual.

Bev has been a sponsor for 14 years through Chiggerville Farm plus has sponsored R4 and national awards. She sponsors the Bev Roberts National Horsemanship Champion award for national champion-

ships on five different horses. She is the general editor of all written communications and forms, maintains a master file of over 200 forms/manuals/guides and is the "Branding Police" assuring consistency of our image to others.


While we showed an increase in members for 2023, we will need to continue to focus on membership this year to sustain and ultimately increase our numbers.

Who is the JC and what does it do? Well, JC stands for Judges Committee, a standing committee defined by the NATRC by-laws.

The committee is made up of a minimum of five NATRC approved judges in good standing: at least two veterinary and three horsemanship judges. Of these, two folks are selected as co-chairs - one vet, one horsemanship. The members hold meetings either by phone, mail, electronic means or in person. A majority of the entire committee is required for any action taken.

People do not become members by chance. They are appointed annually by the president and confirmed by the national board of directors.

The committee is tasked with setting standard qualifications for judges, reviewing and screening applicants for judge's cards and recommending their selection to the board. The board has final approval.

JC members are further tasked with handling concerns, complaints, or protests about judges, including thoroughly investigating the situation and reporting to, and advising, the board of directors, who make the final decision.

And finally, the JC makes recommendations to the board regarding changes in the scorecards, examinations, etc. Certain changes must comply with the rule book, like the change from "Trail Ability/Manners" to "Maneuvering Trail/Behavior."

Presently under discussion is the use of Questionable Soundness and giving completion only points to a grade 3 lame horse at the end of a ride.

Ride Managers Wanted



Consider Ride Share

At a recent ride, I asked the ride managers in attendance to stand up. Many of these managers have been putting on the same ride for several years, some have even managed their rides for over 10 years. Managing a ride can be fulfilling and rewarding but can also be a bit stressful.

Throughout the years, we have watched rides come and go. New ride managers are eager and enthusiastic, wanting to make sure riders have a great experience. After a while, though, the enthusiasm wanes, and after about 5 years of management, burn-out

begins to set in. When this happens, the ride manager starts looking for someone to take over the ride. If the RM can't find a replacement, the ride is then discontinued.

Often, as I sit around the campfire after a ride, I hear stories of wonderful rides that are no longer. So, the question then is, "Can burnout be prevented?" The answer is, "YES!!" If a ride manager put on a ride every other year, this would give them time to decompress. I call this "Ride Share", where two volunteers trade off management every other year.

These are already established rides, maps are generally in place, almost the same volunteers show up at that ride each year, and a new ride manager would have the original manager to use as an information resource. This is also a great way to learn what goes on behind the scenes, giving these new managers a deeper understanding of what goes on at a ride. It also gives a greater appreciation for all those volunteers!

If you have ever considered managing a ride, talk to a current ride manager and volunteer to manage that ride every other year. Let's keep those rides going!

Rules don't cover every situation, nor do we want them to. For riders, considerations for the judges in the judges forum digest are worth knowing.

Obstacles. General considerations:

- Is it safe for horse and rider?
- Is it appropriate for the sport of competitive distance riding?
- Does it adversely affect the flow of the ride?

Safety considerations: NATRC has had insurance directives, complaints involving near wrecks or letters of concern about things such as:

- · requiring a jump,
- · maneuvering on-the-buckle,
- · dragging things from the saddle,
- · backing over an object,
- maneuvering over slippery rocks,
- · asking novices to canter,
- using un-natural obstacles (ex. stepping on a mattress), and
- doing a one-arm mount or a moving dismount.

These are not safe and not appropriate for this sport.

Rider Footwear. If a rider shows up for the in-hand presentation wearing unsafe footwear, such as sandals or flip-flops, simply tell the rider that you'll be happy to examine their horse when they return wearing safe footwear.

Neck Collars. Properly trained, a horse can be safely tied with a neck collar to a trailer. A neck collar instead of a halter would not provide enough control for an in-hand presentation.

Pulls. The Judges Committee and the NBOD feel we can learn more if we track the reasons for pulls. It would be helpful if judges would indicate on each scorecard – both the rider's and the horse's – the reason for the pull.

L = Lameness

M = Metabolic

DQ = Disqualified

RO = Rider Option

For this to work be sure to be true to the codes. For instance, if the horse is judged to be Grade 1 or 2 lame, the rider may wish to opt out of the ride. That is fine, but put down the pull code as lameness instead of rider option. We hope to look at the data and report back to the membership what kinds of troubles our horses experience.

Saddle Definition. The Rule Book specifies that a saddle must be used. The Judges Committee and the NBOD agree for now, "If it's marketed as a saddle, it's a saddle. If it's marketed as a bareback pad, it's a bareback pad."

On September 16, Region 6 celebrated Chuck Edwards at the 50th Anniversary of the Indian Cave CTR. Workers Hall of Fame (400 words) One time only to a person, pair or couple. Each region may nominate one member. The NBOD selects one or more at their

4-H Junior Rider Yearend High Point Team Award

Use your valuable 4-H skills outside the arena and compete for this special award. Trail riding is a great way to cross train your horse for shows, to safely practice your equitation in a scenic setting, and even to use your showmanship skills during in-hand vet checks!

Encourage your 4-H friends to join you at CTRs and compete for this award. Contact us if you would like a presentation to your club to introduce the sport and answer questions.

Eligibility is simple. Compete in any division, nominate yourself, and prove that you are a 4-H member! The specifics:

- 1) The award goes to the high point horse and rider team regardless of the divi-
- Your self-nomination must occur before the end of the ride year, the last Sunday in November. (For 2024, November 24th).
- You must: (a) be an competing member, (b) nominate yourself by contacting our ED, and (c) have your 4-H leader contact our ED to confirm that you are a 4-H member.

Additionally, in a number of states (Colorado for example), 4-H now recognizes competitive trail as a qualifying activity for a 4-H member's project. How cool is that? To document each ride, use this form.

Student Loan & **Scholarship Program**

Student loans and scholarships are available at the amount assigned by the National Board of Directors. Fulltime students who have been members, or whose families have been an active members for at least 3 years, preferred. We also consider students, or whose families, who have been active for less than 3 years but more than 6 months.

Priority: 1st, a student enrolled in an accredited School of Veterinary Medicine; , in studies leading to a degree in Animal Science, Nutrition, Health and/or other related equine field; 3rd, in other related equine studies; 4th, a college student in his/her senior year, then junior, sophomore, freshman. For a student loan, a student enrolled in other studies may be considered.

Scholastic achievement, financial need, and character, are also noted.
